I wo decades ago, (6) Intensitying civil war caused Kayan						
residents to flee Myanmar. Now, 500 (7) so Kayans live in villages						
on the northern Thai border. The tribe has a custom where some women wear rings						
to create the appearance (8) a long neck. This exotic tradition						
inspired the creation of tourism villages in 1985. Some Kayans moved to these artificial
